Report of the Directors for the year ended 31 January 2021

Structure, governance and management

Governing Document

Scourie Community Development Company Limited is a company limited by guarantee and not having a share capital, governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association incorporated on 24th January 2012, and is registered as a charity with the Scottish Charity Register. In the event of the company being wound up, members are required to contribute a sum not exceeding £1.00p.

The structure of the company consists of:-

- (a) the MEMBERS who have the right to attend the annual general meeting (and any extraordinary general meeting) and have important powers under the articles of association and the Act; in particular, the members elect people to serve as directors and take decisions in relation to changes to the articles themselves
- (b) the TRUSTEES (referred to in this report and the financial statements as the DIRECTORS) who hold regular meetings during the period between annual general meetings, and generally control and supervise the activities of the company; in particular, the directors are responsible for monitoring the financial position of the company.

Membership shall be open to anyone aged 16 or over who is a full or part-time residents of the Scourie and District Community Council area in the Highland Council area of Scotland ("the community"). Further, the directors may at their sole discretion admit to membership any person aged 16 or over who, while not a full or part-time resident in the community has a strong connection with or interest in the community.

Recruitment and Appointment of the Committee of Directors

The directors of the company are known as the Committee of Directors and under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association should serve for a period of three years. There must be a minimum of 6 and a maximum of 12 members and with up to nine elected by members. Up to 3 members may be co-opted.

Director Induction and Training

New members are provided with a copy of the Constitution, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the policy documents and the current business plan for Scourie Community Development Company Limited (SCDC Ltd) and the role of OSCR. All directors are encouraged to attend appropriate external training to enhance their knowledge of their role and responsibilities.

Risk Management

Board members, staff and volunteers undertake screening by Disclosure Scotland as required and a contingency Fund is maintained.

Activities, achievements and performance

Scourie Rocks

In January 2020 with funding provided by the Duke of Westminster SCDC engaged the services of community development consultant Helen Houston. Helen is contracted for two years the primary outcome being to bring together the building blocks for a new visitor centre to house the Shelley Collection. Funding also allowed for the engagement of a full design and project management team and a cost consultant.

The name for the project was agreed as Scourie Rocks and Scourie Rocks was presented to the public in an online exhibition on 11 June 2020. Over 200 people tuned in and on the night around 90 question and answers were given. There was an overwhelmingly positive response to the project.

Scourie Rocks planning application was validated on 1st July and was finally approved on 29 September 2020. We suspect the delay to gaining planning permission was due to Covid 19.

The total cost of the project will be c£3.5million. SCDC acknowledges that due to Covid 19 there will now be a delay in delivering the project due to the main funders dealing only with Covid 19 related applications. Most funders will reopen for new projects in early 2021. The business plan has been completed and will be used to support funding application.

A group of five volunteers have been cataloguing the Shelley Collection throughout the year. After items had been catalogued and packed up it was transported to Scourie. The collection is now housed securely in Scourie and our thanks go to the directors and volunteers involved.

SHEPD

Our thanks are extended to Clive Meikle at Bidwells for working on behalf of SCDC to finalise a new SSE access route and wayleave for power cabling across Dr's Park. It took months to resolve and thus we were grateful to have had Clive working for SCDC on the issue and brining it to a successful conclusion.

Housing

SCDC with support from Communities Housing Trust, CHT, held a public meeting seeking ideas from landowners and those seeking housing solutions. As a result of this successful meeting CHT followed up with a visit from their development team. SCDC has develop a brief and will seek a contractor to look further at the development of housing solutions for the village.

Broadband

Thanks to funding from Salmon Pool, Loch Duart Fish Farm, the funding is now in place to implement the broadband project. As permission was refused to have a transmission station on Handa Island the project has been delayed. It is hoped work will commence early in 2021.

Activities, achievements and performance (continued)

Covid 19

Scourie like most communities was impacted by Covid 19. Many seasonal employment opportunities did not become available and some small businesses saw a significant decline in income. Thanks to successful bid writing by Helen funding from a variety of source allowed SCDC to support people in community through the provision of:

- Community larder managed on behalf of SCDC by Scourie Stores
- PPE which was managed by director Angus Mackay. When a positive test was experienced in the village access to the free PPE was made more easily available through Scourie Stores.
- Counselling service was provided free through the Scottish Counselling Service
- Personal support: fuel, telephone top up, white goods were just some of the items provided to people experiencing a reduction in income due to Covid 19
- Christmas lunch to all the older, disabled or carers in the community
- Children received a treat box and a creative box.

The end of the Covid 19 impact on our community is still not yet in sight. Until village life gets back to "normal" SCDC will continue to provide support to those who have been impacted by the restrictions caused by the virus.

Development Manager

Helen has had a busy year and whilst progress on Scourie Rocks has not followed the expected timeline all the work detailed above has kept her more than occupied. Whilst delivering the above she has also been involved in Sutherland Community Partnership, Sutherland Fuel Poverty Group, Sutherland Food Group, Voluntary Groups Sutherland, North West Highland Vision Group, EU Collaborative Fuel Poverty Group, Sutherland Resilience Group, Scourie Community Council. Helen has accessed a further six months funding thus her contract will now extend until June 2022.

1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year and in the preceding year.

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015) - Charities SORP (FRS102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Donations

Donations received are recorded at the time the charity becomes entitled to the resource.

Membership fees

Membership fees received are recorded at the time of receipt.

Grants

Grants received are included in incoming resources when they are receivable, except when conditions attached to such grants have not yet been fulfilled, when the income is deferred. Grants of a capital nature are treated as a restricted fund and released to the unrestricted funds over the life of the asset.

Expenditure

Expenditure is included on the accruals basis, gross of irrecoverable VAT, and recognised when there is a legal or constructive obligation to pay.

Fund accounting

Restricted funds: funds held which are resticted for use for specific purposes.

Unrestricted funds: funds which the trustees are free to use, in accordance with the charitable objects.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Pier renovation - Over the period of the lease (10 years)
Pavilion restoration - Over the period of the lease (25 years)
Picnic benches and container - 20% and 10% straight line respectively

9 Restriction on use of land

The land shown in note 6 is an area of approximately 1.8 hectares known as the Doctor's Park, Scourie, purchased for the sum of £40,000 (plus fees) with funds provided by the Scottish Land Fund.

In brief, use of the property is restricted to the creation and development of a Visitor Centre for which, as a minimum mark of progress, planning permission, approved by the vendors, must be obtained before April 2021. Failing this, the vendors have the right to repurchase the property at the purchase price noted, £40,000. Legal security registered at Companies House has been given in favour of the vendors to this effect.

10 Controlling party

Scourie Community Development Company Limited is a company limited by guarantee. The liability of members is limited and is not to exceed £1. The ultimate controlling party is therefore considered to be the board of trustees.
